Welcome to the inaugural ACID-FREE Los Angeles Art Book Market, a collective undertaking of 19 local publishers, editors, and booksellers. * Books have a unique way of facilitating dialogue, community, and friendship. For many small publishers, book fairs have become critical for this interchange—a hybrid economic / social space where audiences and colleagues come together at regular intervals throughout the year. * Precisely because the art book community is so small and interconnected, many of us felt a real shock and sadness when we heard about the death of Shannon Michael Cane, the longtime organizer of Printed Matter's Los Angeles and New York Art Book Fairs. It soon became clear that the LA Art Book Fair would be postponed in 2018. It was within this context that a group of LA-based art publishers began speaking informally about ways to fill this gap in solidarity with the efforts of those working before and around us. * With so many voices, the start of our organizing process was cumbersome and daunting. We met as a large group and talked about new ways to approach the art book fair model. We have all stood behind tables at so many book fairs over the years; many in the group had developed a sort of complex love / hate relationship with them. * Out of the first few meetings, we began to find our way: outlining a set of core principles which favored a non-hierarchical, ad-hoc working method; a financial structure that was not profit-driven; and a spirit of inclusion and collaboration whenever possible. * The Acid-Free Organizing Committee worked to bring together a group of exhibitors and programs that respond to the diversity of publishing practices within the city of Los Angeles and beyond. ** Our interests coalesced vaguely around publishing practices that maintain positions of criticality and self-reflexivity. The looseness of this framework allowed us to invite exhibitors that operate on different economic models and at various levels of professionalization—including publishers and producers working within traditional not-for-profits, independent social

enterprises, commercial galleries, and artist-led collectives. * Acid-Free was developed with real interest in and excitement about the other fairs and initiatives emerging around the city, especially those that materialized in the wake of the post-ponement of the LA Art Book Fair. These various events—including Community Service, LA Pages, Cultural Traffic, the SFV Art Book Fair, and others—speak to the breadth and vibrancy of artists' publishing practices in and around Los Angeles. * As one node within this growing local and international nexus of activity, it is our hope that Acid-Free offers visitors and participants a chance to appreciate the resilience and energy of the independent art publishing community. Stay a while: check out the books, listen to a talk, have some pizza, and relax in the company of a community of people who love art and books.





Growers' Guides, Weed Publications, and the Underground Press 1966-73

The 'back to the land' movement of the 1960s saw hippies embrace farming and self-sustainability. The art of cannabis cultivation, associated politics, and psychedelia was shared through a network of independent presses, head shops, and bookstores. A distinct aesthetic emerged in print production, design, illustration, humor, and writing. This period planted the seeds for the legalization movement, sparked a budding 'weed media,' and sealed the pot leaf as counter-cultural icon.

As Fluxus and Mail Art groups published and disseminated texts, artists' books, and ephemera around the globe in the 1960s and '70s, its key progenitors—George Maciunas, Dick Higgins, and Ray Johnson—saw this work less as a new movement and more as a way of life. Created in the pre-digital age, Fluxus and Mail Art materials are now touchstones for contemporary artists, influencing artists' publications and challenging the conventions of mainstream art publishing.
